National Curriculum Objectives for KS2

Pupils should be taught to:

- listen attentively to spoken language and show understanding by joining in and responding
- explore the patterns and sounds of language through songs and rhymes and link the spelling, sound and meaning of words
- engage in conversations; ask and answer questions; express opinions and respond to those of others; seek clarification and help
- speak in sentences, using familiar vocabulary, phrases and basic language structures
- develop accurate pronunciation and intonation so that others understand when they are reading aloud or using familiar words and phrases
- present ideas and information orally to a range of audiences
- read carefully and show understanding of words, phrases and simple writing;
- appreciate stories, songs, poems and rhymes in the language
- broaden their vocabulary and develop their ability to understand new words that are introduced into familiar written material, including through using a dictionary
- write phrases from memory, and adapt these to create new sentences, to express ideas clearly
- describe people, places, things and actions orally and in writing
- understand basic grammar appropriate to the language being studied, including (where relevant): feminine, masculine and neuter forms and the conjugation of high -frequency verbs; key features and patterns of the language; how to apply these, for instance, to build sentences; and how these differ from or are similar to English.

By the end of Key Stage 2, a Moor End linguist should be able to...

- Enthuse about learning a language.
- Sing several songs in French to aid their learning.
- Show a cultural awareness of France; it's customs, landmarks and cuisine.
- Hold a short conversation in French.
- Read taught words confidently and recognise them amongst longer passages.
- Use a dictionary when necessary to check new words.
- Describe some differences between French grammar and English grammar.
- Write some sentences in French from the words taught.
