Explore your family or community “mini census”:

- Ask at home how many people live in your house, their ages, and one fact about what they do (job, hobby, etc.).
- Present your findings in a simple chart, bar graph, or table.
- Add a short paragraph comparing your household to what you think the census in your area 100 years ago might have looked like.

Carry out a “shadow investigation” at home:

- Choose an object and shine a torch (or lamp) on it from different angles.
- Draw or take photos of how the shadow changes when you move the light closer, further, higher, or lower.
- Label your work to explain what noticed.



Make a “Light Fact Poster”:

- Research 5 fascinating facts about light (e.g. how rainbows form, why the sky looks blue, how animals see in the dark).
- Present them in a colourful way with drawings, diagrams, or even a comic strip style.

Create a short presentation on PowerPoint about you. This could be about a club you attend after school, about what you have just done over the summer holidays, or your favourite book and why. It is up to you.

Create a short fact file to explain why people move to or from a place. You could:

- Interview a family member about why they chose to live where they do.
- Research one reason why people move (jobs, education, safety, weather, etc.) and make a mini poster or leaflet to explain it.
- Include drawings, maps, or symbols to help show your ideas.

Create a “Photo Frame Collage”:

- Make your own picture frame from cardboard or paper.
- Inside the frame, stick or draw images that capture what you think is a “special moment” or “photo-worthy” scene in your life (e.g. a celebration, a favourite place, your pet, a memory).
- Be creative with colours and materials!

Create a “Guide to a Church” for someone who has never visited one before:

- Draw a simple map or diagram of the inside of a church (altar, font, pews, pulpit, stained glass, etc.).
- Label the key features and explain in 1–2 sentences what each is used for.

REMEMBER: You should also try each week to read daily, practise your spellings, time tables and go on Ed Shed every week.
